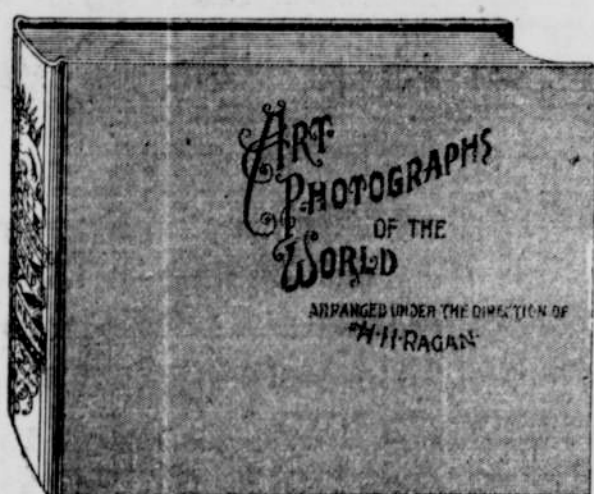

## COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

The proceedings of the commissioners not published last week are as follows: In the matter of extending the time for the county assessor to complete the assessment roll for 1897. It appearing to the court that at the regular August term for the year 1897, the assessor, E. J. Wood, appeared before this court and asked that this court fix a day certain in which said assessment rolls should be completed and that said court at said August term of this court for 1897 did then and there fix the 13th day of September, 1897, as the time when said roll should be completed, and directed the said assessor to give the notice required by statute of the meeting of the board of equalization on said 13th day of September, 1897; but that this court omitted to make said order of record. It is therefore ordered and adjudged by this court that a nunc pro tunc order and entry be now made of the action of this court in fixing a day certain for the completion of said assessment roll. In the matter of the application of county treasurer for leave to transfer \$4.40 from the general fund of the county to school districts 11 and 55 to correct an error heretofore made in crediting same to wrong fund. It is ordered by the court that the sum of \$4.40 be transferred from the general fund to school districts Nos. 55 and 11 in order to correct said error.
