REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION.

A republican convention for the state of Oregon is hereby called to meet in the city of Astoria on Thursday, April 14, 1898, at the hour of 11 o'clock a. m.

FIRST DISTRICT CONVENTION.

A republican convention for the first congressional district of Oregon is hereby called to meet in the city of Eugene, on Monday, April 11th, 1898, at the hour of 2:30 o'clock p. m.

In this country, the right to declare war is vested in congress. In theory, it rests with the people, but as the people could not speedily be polled on such a question, the framers of the constitution finally left the right with congress, the representative of the people.

The senate voted Monday on the question of seating Corbett, the result being 50 to 19 against. Since the negative report of the committee two months ago, no one has expected that he would be seated, but the majority on the final vote is greater than many anticipated.

The leading newspapers of the M. E. church and the M. E. church south, are engaged in a redhot controversy over a bill recently passed by the lower house of congress, appropriating \$288,000 to pay for the use, occupancy and damage of the publishing house of the southern M. E. church by the federal army during the war.

this county wants and is entitled to a representative of its own. The man who now represents this county knows about as much about this county, its people, its resources and its needs, as a dive keeper knows about heaven and cares still less.

The shout of "boss" and "boss rule" is and always has been the cry of the opposition, and the Transcript in taking it up at this time merely repeats, parrot-like, the mouthings of the enemy.
