LATEST FROM WASHINGTON.

The vital point in the Cuban situation, viz., independence, has shifted itself from Spain to Madrid, where the Spanish government is now giving grave and earnest consideration to propositions presented by the government of the United States.

The propositions submitted by this country contemplate a complete and immediate cessation of hostilities in Cuba, the return of the reconcentrados to their usual avocations and the independence of Cuba, this last feature to be secured probably on an indemnity basis by which the island would pay a substantial sum for its freedom from Spanish rule.

It has been made perfectly clear to Spain by President McKinley that nothing less than a close of the war and the independence of the island will suffice as an adequate settlement.
