The egg-rolling social given by the Christian church at Wright's hall Saturday night was well attended and afforded a great deal of amusement. The rolling was something after the manner of a bowling alley, the eggs being blown out and names inserted. At the foot of the alley the shell would break and expose the name of your partner for supper. The social added over \$20 to the church building fund.

Dr. John's lecture in reply to Ingersoll Saturday evening at the Methodist church was poorly attended, not more than 75 people being present. The lecture, however, was an intellectual treat, and persons who are not professing christians pronounced it grand. The lecturer aimed to combat only those arguments of Ingersoll which seem the most plausible. For instance, the Mosaic account of creation states that light appeared the first day, but the sun did not appear until the fourth day. This Ingersoll calls one of Moses' great mistakes. Dr. John demonstrated that modern astronomy confirms the Mosaic account. The constellation of Orion has patches of light in formation which are fast developing into a sun, and astronomers have no doubt that such has been the uniform rule in the formation of suns. If modern astronomy corroborates the writings of Moses, at a time when astronomy was not known and science undeveloped, who shall say that the writings were not inspired? In reply to Ingersoll's charge that no kind and loving God would take life and permit it to be taken by others, Dr. John took the view that life is a trust, God-given, and that a trust is dissolvable at the option of the giver. That the children of Israel were persecuted and slain was but the natural and necessary way to bring them out of the ignorance and sin into which they had fallen, and that to have accomplished the same result by one sweeping act of love and forgiveness would have been no more possible than to tame by caresses a fierce and untamed lion or adder. Ingersoll's assertion that if he had been God he would have made health catching instead of disease, was given as an instance in which the wit of the great agnostic covers up the truth. Everybody should know that health is more catching than disease; that it is caught in sleep, in breathing pure air, in sunshine, in eating wholesome food, in observing laws of health, and that but about five per cent of the average human life is subject to unrest and disease. The lecture closed with a very eloquent peroration, depicting the utter hopelessness and despair of the agnostic in the presence of death, in contrast with the inspiring sentiment felt by that soul which looks forward to the lofty heights to be attained by a just conception of the God-made idea of immortality.
