The lecture, however, was an intellectual treat, and perpronounced it grand. The lecturer aimed to combat only those arguments of Ingersoll which seem the most plausible. For instance, the Mosaic account of creation states that light appeared the first day, but the sun did not appear until the fourth day. This Ingersoll calls one of Moses' great mistakes. Dr. John demonstrated that modern astronomy confirms the Mosaic account. The constellation of Orion has patches of light in a sun, and astromoners have no doubt the formation of suns. If modern astronomy corroborates the writings of Moses. at a time when astronomy was not known and science undeveloped, who shall say that the writings were not inspired? In reply to Ingersoll's charge that no kind and loving God would take life and permit it to be taken by others, Dr. John took the view that life is a trust. Godgiven, and that a trust is dissolvable at the option of the giver.
