THE LATEST.

Portland, Or., Apr. 28th, 5 p. m.—Portland war excitement is but slightly abated. Great activity is seen around army headquarters.

Early part of day, Key West—Spanish steamer Guido, bound from Corunna to Havana with large cargo of provisions and money for Spanish troops has been captured and will be added to prize fleet.

London, 2 p. m.—It is announced at Lisbon that Portugal government has stopped dispatches of information concerning movements of Spanish warships in her harbor.

OUR warships will go into action with the motto, "Remember the Maine." The reckoning for the black deed of treachery will be one likely to prevent its repetition.
