WASHINGTON LETTER.

April 28th, 1898.

The fair and exposition in aid of the fund for the construction of a national Masonic temple to be erected in Washington, opened on April 11th, and closed last Wednesday, the 27th inst. The attendance on the opening night was such as to lead the most hopeful among the observers of the gregariousness of the Washington public to believe that so great a throng could not be again gotten together even by the many beautiful decorations and unique, striking attractions of the enterprise. For fifteen afternoons and evenings, however, the crowd of the first night was duplicated, proving most conclusively that its magnetic power to compel attendance did not diminish. Every night during the fair the stirring of patriotic airs rendered by the different bands, gave those present opportunity to testify to the quality of patriotism animating the Washington public, and never was the opportunity neglected. "Dixie," "Yankee Doodle," "Marching through Georgia" always brought forth rapturous cheers, but "The Star Spangled Banner" is the tune which really jeopardized the integrity of Convention hall and annex, for if ever an audience threatened to "bring down the rafters," it was when Healy's or the Marine band stirred the soul of everyone within hearing of the strains of that battle hymn. It is estimated that the fair will net in the neighborhood of \$50,000 for the temple fund.

Another event of much interest was the fourth biennial convention of the society of Colonial Dames. After much discussion amendments to the constitution, proposed last year, allowing societies in non Colonial states to come in through one of the original states, passed. Among McMinnville's best people are many ladies who will be interested in the society now being formed in Oregon.

The subject of war revenue is now attracting the attention of congress, and inasmuch as we have entered upon a struggle which promises to be no comic opera war, but may be a protracted and costly enterprise, it is to be hoped that party lines may be entirely broken down so far as war measures are concerned, but it is useless to deny the manifest disposition of the silver forces to oppose a bond issue except some concessions are made.

In the house, after several democratic and populist members had attacked the proposed bond issue, Mr. Olmstead of Pennsylvania, very concisely outlined their positions when he declared that "if the bonds are made payable in silver, the silverites will not object to the issuance of a thousand million of them."

So far, the minority have, with but very few exceptions, heartily supported the administration in a thoroughly non-partisan manner, and it is greatly to be hoped that entire absence of partisanship and unanimity of purpose will mark the consideration of all war measures from now until the cessation of hostilities.
