 The report of proceedings of the grand council of Royal and Select Masters of Oregon for 1898, just out in pamphlet, contains portraits and biographical sketches of the first and last illustrious grand masters of the order. They are father and son—Asa Harvey Hodson, who came to the head of the order in 1885, and Orlando Orville Hodson, who occupied the honored station during 1897—both of McMinnville.
 Died—At the residence of his brother, Daniel S. Holman, on Tuesday, May 24th, 1898, Mr. W. C. Holman, aged 74 years, 2 months and 6 days. Mr. Holman came to Oregon in 1845, but of late years was a resident of Los Angeles, Calif. Death resulted from heart disease. The funeral will be held at the Christian church tomorrow, at 2 p. m. and burial made in Masonic cemetery.

The baccalaureate sermon was preached on Sunday morning by Bishop Stanford of Pennsylvania, who gave an able sermon from the text, "Thy word is truth." The bishop has a style somewhat peculiar to himself, yet is a very entertaining speaker. On Tuesday evening Rev. Ray Palmer of Portland gave his eloquent lecture on the subject: "Is this Old World Growing Brighter?" to a large and enthusiastic audience. The speaker viewed the world from the most optimistic standpoint. He closed his discourse with a wonderfully dramatic and patriotic eulogy to Cuba, a scathing rebuke to Spain, and a tender panegyric of praise for the late Mr. Gladstone. Mr. Palmer is a rising young pulpit orator of whom the Baptists are justly proud, and he is already a decided and growing success in his profession. Miss Ella Hoberg of Portland, a niece of Rev. Joseph Hoberg of this city, whose name is frequently seen in the city papers in connection with favorable musical mention, was present, and delighted the audience with two fine vocal selections. She has a voice of rare strength and sweetness, and has had the benefit of skillful training. Mr. C. G. Adams of Portland, a good baritone singer, gave a song on the loss of the battleship Maine, which was just out, and had just reached Oregon, the copy he sang from being the first copy sold in the city of Portland. The rendition was stoutly encored, and he responded with a humorous selection. On Wednesday at 11 a. m. occurred the graduation exercises, the graduates being Mr. Alexander Smith, Miss Myrtle A. Hewitt and Miss M. Viola Guenther. In the afternoon the library association had its meeting and in the evening the alumni association met in reunion, with ice cream refreshments, etc. Lafayette seminary is backed by a number of energetic and untiring workers, notably among them being Rev. C. C. Poling and Prof. D. M. Metzger. Both are bright men, having the entire confidence and support of the community, and their hearts and purse strings are interested in the success of the school.
