The following is a full and correct copy of resolutions adopted by the peoples, the democratic and silver republican parties, and duly signed by the nomi-nees thereof, at their convention held on April 25th, 1898, at McMinnville Oregon. We, your committee upon resolutions, beg to report the following :

out the spirit of this resolution and to reduce the expenses of the county to the lowest amount consistent with good government.

That we denounce recent republican legislatures for their corruptions and extravagances and for their repudiation of their pledges of retrenchment and reform made to the people, and for their em-ployment of hordes of useless clerks, to be paid with taxes levied on the people. We favor the enactment of a carefully drawn registry law to prevent repeating

and illegal voting. That we indorse the union platform, adopted by the conventions of the people's, the democratic and the silver republican parties in Portland in March last.
