GREAT SPEECH BY SCHOONMAKER.
The Jerseyman Leads the Van as a Campaigner.

The court house again overflowed Saturday night to hear the Hon. F. X. Schoonmaker, the peerless discussor of correct public policies. Those who heard him in his defense of the president's war policy heard a true patriot, and a marked contrast with the sedition talk of Mr. Sovereign. He said:

"I am here as the personal friend of Thomas H. Tongue. He is one of the most industrious and valuable men we have in congress today, but owing to his sense of duty he cannot be with you tonight. Today, Mr. Tongue is engaged in supporting the administration of this government in its war measures; for sound money and protection. Mr. Tongue is upholding the hands of the president for, perhaps, the very life of our country, and doing his duty as a loyal and patriotic representative from Oregon in our national congress.

"Suppose that Mr. Veatch was just as capable a man as Mr. Tongue is known to be, would it be good policy on your part to take any chances? Mr. Tongue has gained great experience in the past two years, far more than men ordinarily do in their first term in congress, and it might not be safe to swap horses while crossing a stream. Mr. Veatch is a democrat and does not believe with the republicans in sound money. He is opposed to the appropriating of money to conduct the war. Do the people of Oregon, who have sent over 1,000 young men to battle for their country's honor, want a man to represent them in congress who will support our president, or are they willing to send one who will always oppose the chief executive of our nation? That question is left for you to decide. Of these men who have gone out of Oregon in response to their country's call to duty, how many will return? God only knows, but certainly some will never return to their homes in Oregon. And yet, Mr. Veatch says that instead of the \$13 per month in gold, \$6.40 is enough for such men. Mr. Tongue says \$15.60 per month is not enough for these brave sons of Oregon to receive. Which will you vote for—Tongue or Veatch?"

Mr. Schoonmaker then entered into a long but interesting exposition of the money question as it now presents itself to the American people; paid a high compliment to the sound money democrats, who laid aside party for principle, and closed with a strong defense for protection, demonstrating by many apt illustrations the real benefits of a protective tariff to the many industries of the United States. He spoke for over two hours, and was most attentively listened to throughout.

These Resolutions.

The following is a full and correct copy of resolutions adopted by the peoples, the democratic and silver republican parties, and duly signed by the nominees thereof, at their convention held on April 25th, 1898, at McMinnville Oregon.

We, your committee upon resolutions, beg to report the following:
Resolved: That the nominees of this convention for senator and representatives are hereby pledged to do all in their power, if elected, to reduce the expenses of the state government to the lowest amount consistent with good government, and to oppose the employment of more clerks in the legislature than shall be absolutely necessary to do the clerical work of the legislature.

That the salaries now allowed by law to the sheriff, the clerk, and the county recorder are sufficient to pay for all the work required to be done by these officers and their deputies, and that the nominees of this convention for those offices are hereby pledged to pay their deputies out of the salaries now allowed by law to said officers, and not to present to the county court any bills or claims for salaries or pay for deputies, and the nominees of this convention for county judge and county commissioners are hereby pledged to do all in their power to carry out the spirit of this resolution and to reduce the expenses of the county to the lowest amount consistent with good government.

That we denounce recent republican legislatures for their corruptions and extravagances and for their repudiation of their pledges of retrenchment and reform made to the people, and for their employment of hordes of useless clerks, to be paid with taxes levied on the people.

We favor the enactment of a carefully drawn registry law to prevent repeating and illegal voting.

That we endorse the union platform, adopted by the conventions of the people's, the democratic and the silver republican parties in Portland in March last.

That all the candidates nominated by this convention be required to sign these resolutions as a personal and individual pledge to the people that these resolutions will be faithfully carried out.

That these resolutions with signatures attached be published.
