The carpenter contract for building the new Christian church at Carlton has been let to Mr. Belt of Pike, late of Nebraska, for \$245. Some time ago Rev. Sickafosse, the pastor, said that if they built a church he would do the painting. It is believed he was joking, but now the church members talk of holding him to the agreement. The site of the building is in the little fir grove just east of town, which has been cleared out and makes a very pretty location. The building is to be 41x49 feet, with eil 20x25 ft. It is estimated that the total cost of building and one block of ground will be \$900, and the church already has a subscription of over \$1,000, and a growing membership.

The experiment station at Corvallis reports several specimens of diseased wheat and oats sent in. The plants are affected when from six inches to a foot high. The leaves turn brown at the tips, or a reddish cast, and gradually die back to the ground. The main stock still maintains its green color and endeavors to overcome the disease by sending out new leaves which in turn become affected and turn brown. The disease spreads from a few plants first seen until quite an extent become affected. Some of the area on the college farm contain from one-fourth to one-half acre; and from other localities whole fields have been reported as being attacked.

About two hundred persons from this city and vicinity went on the conductors' excursion to Astoria and Seaside on Sunday. The crowd from all points was estimated at about 6,000. Two and a half hours was the longest time any of them were permitted at the destination, and the weather wasn't pleasant even then. Several steps were knocked from the coaches on one train by running into a rock, and a young man named Thomas, a painter of Forest Grove, attempting to board one of these cars while in motion when passing through Portland, lost his footing and fell under the wheels, both legs being cut off above the ankles. He lived a couple of days only. The return of the excursionists to McMinnville was after daylight Monday morning.
