To Wheel Riders.
Ed. Reporter—At a meeting of the city council held July 6th, 1898, ordinance No. 193 was passed and approved, the first section of which reads: "It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to ride any bicycle on any sidewalk, upon any street within the corporate limits of the city of McMinnville, Yamhill County, Oregon." The penalty is a fine of \$1.00 to \$10.00 or imprisonment one to five days, or both. The ordinance goes into effect on the 16th of July—10 days after its approval.
