 J. C. Cooper received a telegram from his son Arthur, a few days since, dated New York, announcing his arrival there from South America. The telegram did not reveal his intentions in respect to returning to Oregon. He is ambitious to enter the military service for Uncle Sam.  
 Uncle George Willis was down from his mountain retreat the first of the week. Uncle George is 80 years old and as sound in body and mind and as good a republican as they make. His wife is four years older than himself and the pure ozone of the mountain air has kept her equally well preserved, he says.  
 The McMinnville Building and Loan association, after a brief and uneventful career, decided by agreement of its stockholders to go into dissolution. Many of the members became stockholders in the Pacific States Savings Building and Loan association of San Francisco, which has established a branch here, under management of R. L. Conner, who will receive applications for stock and loans.  
 A rather remarkable disaster occurred in the harvest field of Jerome Derby last Friday. The team that was hauling the binder became frightened and ran away with it. Naturally, anything of a harvestable nature that came in contact with the rapid-flying sickle bar was promptly leveled, but the extraordinary occurred when the team reined up and began operations on a board fence. Eight posts were cut squarely off, the boards passing through all right, though not as well bound as if they had been wheat. The team then became detached from the machine, jumped two barb-wire fences, dragging the tongue after them, and finally brought up unscathed. Although the machine was badly damaged in the end, its work on the fence ought to be a valuable testimonial as to its substantial qualities.  
 Charley Benedict, a McMinnville boy who was in Idaho when the call for troops came and who joined the 1st Idaho infantry, was in the third expedition to Manila that arrived at Honolulu on the 6th of July. A letter has just been received by his parents, dated at Honolulu, the 7th. From his representation it appears that the arrival of the third was hailed with as much enthusiasm by the island Americans as was the first expedition. He states that \$20,000 was raised to entertain American soldiers and as much more was pledged if necessary. It was a kind of surprise to him after all, after getting 2000 miles away from home, to find so much Americanism—American flags flying everywhere and everybody singing, whistling, or playing our familiar national airs. Honolulu is described as a beautiful city, "having the largest sugar refinery in the world, ice works, iron works, street cars, electric lights, telephone and telegraph facilities, but no cable to the outside world." The expedition left for Manila on the 8th.


