Up to the middle of last week Oregonians were congratulating themselves over an uncommonly pleasant summer season. Just then the mercury began hopping upward and on Thursday reached the altitude of 96 degrees. This was uncomfortable, but the following day it was 98 deg., and on Saturday, Sunday and Monday touched the 100 mark.
