The Southern Pacific has just issued a special family ticket rate, good for thirty rides between the various points on its line and Portland, for the next six months. Also a 52-ride individual monthly commutation ticket. The family rate from McMinnville to Portland is \$30 for thirty rides, and half that amount for individual ticket. North Yamhill rates are \$23.60 and \$12. Lafayette rates are \$20.65 and \$10. Dayton rates are \$19.45 and \$10.

The court house boys have resolved against book agents. Hereafter any book agent entering the court house will be charged an entrance fee of 50 cents, and 50 cents an hour for all the time he shall take in presenting the merits of his book. 

The county school fund, which now amounts to \$10,305.31, will also be sent out next week, at the rate of \$2.15 cents for each pupil. Supt. Littlefield says it will be his policy to distribute this county fund whenever it reaches an amount equal to or more than one dollar to each pupil, rather than wait till a given time of the year, while school boards are compelled to borrow and pay interest, when money due them lies in the county treasury.




