E. A. Dewrett, Performance of the first expedition, the first word of consequence was received from him after the surrender, written under date of July 17. He says:

> for not writing sooner, but wanted to see the stars and stripes float over Santiago before I wrote, and then a person is in great luck to get any materials here. By the way, when you write again put in cavalrymen saddled and went behind remain for a three weeks' visit. General Shafter and about a hundred officers and saw him receive the hand of the Spanish general. The Spanish general offered his sword, but Shafter took his hand. Then the generals on both sides shook hands and 100 cavalrymen presented sabers to 100 Spanish infantrynen and they gave us a present. This took place between the lines. Then we rode into Santiago. Every 100 yards or ess the street was blockaded by rifle pits and breastworks of barrels, boxes, etc.,!filled with dirt. We also ran into three barbed wire entanglements. No one except U. S. soldiers could have taken the streets we saw, and then the artillery would have had to shelled it good. We rode up the rocky street to norses or dismounted and sat on the church. He returned on Tuesday. idewalk till almost 12 o'clock; then we were called to attention, faced the building and at 12 the American stars and stripes, a little 3-foot flag, went to the top of the flagstaff. The 9th infantry band played "Star Spangled Banner," 'Hot Time' and other tunes. I felt a curious thrill go through me as the flag

went up and I wanted to yell, but I had to content myself with giving a "present saber." Then we were split up in squads of five or six and patroled the town for 8:15 A M any of our men. One old reprobate came out and "chingowed" us out of sight. Another, a woman, appeared like she wanted to get us down and beat us. The Spanish soldiers, though, are as glad as we are. For the last four or five lays, till yesterday and to-day, I have had headache and a little fever, but with easy. We were camped then in a low, mud or in damp clothes, and twice the water chased us out. We are on a hill town as quite bustling. now, and I feel O. K. I have been busy since we landed here, and am on duty all the time now. Our troop was provost guard and had the little bunches of prisoners to guard. During the battle I carried messages and escorted a wagon train up to the front. I also helped Dr. Stone of Riley at his table until I a. m. the first night. It was a fearful slaughter of men that first day. You would see all \$1200. Inquire of E. S. Remmington, kinds of wounded all the way from the hospital to the firing line. Men shot twice walking in and the road full of ambulances, wagons and litters full of wounded, and a greater number walking in. I almost said, 'Give us peace at any price,' but I didn't. I do say give us no more wars after this. The town of Santiago is built of plaster, I call it. The streets are narrow, rocky and stinking.
