OVER two million people have visited the Omaha exposition.

HAVING fulfilled his promise to set Cuba free, Col. Bryan may now return, all fresh and gory, to the task of setting silver free.

SOUTH DAKOTA is the only state that will vote on woman suffrage this year. The measure was submitted once before, and failed.

THE roar of the British lion before the gates of Paris, may help to preserve decorum toward the United States while the peace commission is in session.

SPANISH evacuation of Porto Rico was completed Monday. The American flag now floats in undisputed grandeur over new possessions in both oceans.

"COIN" Harvey has issued an edict to the effect that representatives of New York, New Jersey and other eastern states will not be admitted to the democratic national convention of 1900.

THE relations between England and France appear strained to the critical point. There is no longer an attempt to disguise the fact that France is preparing for war, while England is said to be ready for the worst, and the air is full of rumors as to the probabilities of alliances with other nations in the event of war.

VERY little interest is taken in campaign speeches in those states which are to hold an election next month. Business matters are so much improved that it is the most conclusive argument the people can have that they have no reason to regret the restoration of the republican party to power.

THE recent speeches by President McKinley on his trip to the west contained some very happy expressions. He struck a harmonious cord with the railroad men at Chicago when in speaking of improved conditions he said: "There are no empties on the side track now."

SPEAKING of the opposition of the trans-continental railway lines to the Nicaragua canal, the Oregonian speaks forcibly to the point when it says: "The national safety ought to be the supreme consideration, but on selfish grounds the railroad are unwise in fighting the canal."

THE union caucus called to nominate city officers, met Wednesday evening and adjourned for a week without action. The citizens' caucus called by the mayor is tonight and the republican caucus is Monday evening.

Whoever takes a look over the history of the United States will find that the periods of business stagnation all occurred when the democrats were in control of the government, except in a single instance, that of 1873. It will be found, too, that the only periods of prosperity which the country has seen in the past half century have been while the republicans were in power.

It may be true that President McKinley's wayside speeches, on his recent western trip, are not all up to the mark set by ex-president Harrison. Few, if any of his predecessors, would not suffer by the comparison.

George C. Saxton, the murdered brother of Mrs. McKinley, was evidently of the opinion during his life that being a president's wife was joy enough for one woman.

There seems to be a little misapprehension on the part of a few as to the objects and advantages of calling party conventions to nominate city officers. So far as the republicans are concerned who signed their names to a call, we feel competent to state that their object was not to gain any partisan advantage, but solely to promote greater freedom of expression and choice at the elections.
