**Meeting of Presbytery.**

The annual presbytery of the Cumb. Presbyterian church, comprising this city and Portland, met on Wednesday evening. The opening sermon was preached by Rev. W. R. Bishop of Portland on the subject of Stewardship. Other ministers present were Revs. G. A. Blair, W. C. Crawford and Geo. W. Fender. After the sermon the presbytery was constituted by Rev. W. C. Crawford. Rev. Fender was received to membership on letter from the Dallas, Tex., presbytery, and Rev. T. H. Henderson was granted dismissal and recommendation to the association of Congregational ministers of Portland. Revs. Geo. W. Grannis and R. W. King were invited to seats in the presbytery. On Thursday morning Rev. Bishop was elected moderator and Rev. Blair clerk pro tem. Rev. Crawford being granted leave of absence at an early hour. The standing committees were appointed by the moderator, and the question of church extension was discussed. The time of holding annual presbytery was changed to meet in conjunction with the synod, and will be held in this city next April. Rev. Bishop was chosen delegate and Rev. Fender alternate to the general assembly which meets in Denver next May. F. E. Rogers was chosen lay delegate, and T. B. Allen of Portland alternate. The presbytery closed last evening with a missionary meeting.
