### CITY CAUCUSES.

Pursuant to the call of Mayor Christman, a citizens' caucus was held in the court house Friday evening, which named the following ticket: For mayor, Dr. J. F. Calbreath; recorder, A. V. R. Snyder; marshal, C. H. Neal. Dr. Calbreath has since declined the nomination. The voters of the third ward the same evening named W. D. McDonald for councilman.

On Monday evening the republicans met pursuant to call, and were called to order by Dr. Calbreath, who was chosen chairman. F. J. Martin was chosen secretary and E. C. Apperson assistant. On motion of O. H. Irvine a committee of three was appointed by the chair on order of business, as follows: O. H. Irvine, J. P. Irvine and C. D. Johnson. The order adopted was as follows: Nomination and election of candidates for mayor, recorder and marshal; ten minutes recess for holding ward caucuses to nominate councilmen and ward committeemen for ensuing year; report from ward meetings and ratification of nominations; reading of resolutions; adjournment. On motion of M. A. Baker the order of resolutions was made to precede nominations, and the following resolution was read:

WHEREAS, the present common council of the city of McMinnville, state of Oregon, has prior hereto, by ordinance, voted to each member of the council, including the mayor, free light and water, and that by operation of said ordinance there is now being furnished to each member of the present council and mayor, except Councilman Daniel, free light and water at the expense of the taxpayers of said city; be it therefore

Resolved, That we condemn the acts of the present mayor and city council in thus appropriating to themselves free light and water, and we hereby pledge the nominees of this convention to repeal the ordinance giving to the mayor and councilmen free light and water.

Councilman Daniel was present and stated that as a member of that body he had never taken a position favoring the free water and light ordinance, and that it was passed in his absence, and that he was not receiving the benefits of the same. Thereupon, the exception as appearing in the resolution, was interpolated, and the same adopted. For mayor, R. L. Conner named Capt. Wyatt Harris, and O. H. Irvine named Dr. Calbreath. The latter declined and moved Harris' nomination by acclamation, which was carried. J. E. Brooks named R. L. Conner for recorder, and on motion of W. L. Warren the nomination was made by acclamation. A ballot was taken without nominations for marshal, and resulted in favor of C. H. Neal on the third trial. The wards nominated as follows: First ward, J. W. Gault for councilman, W. S. Link, committeeman; second ward, Geo. W. Jones for councilman, W. T. Vinton committeeman; third ward, W. D. McDonald for councilman, O. H. Irvine committeeman. These nominations were all ratified.

On Wednesday evening the unionists held an adjourned meeting, with Chas. Grissen in the chair and F. S. Harding secretary. Messrs. Wood and Mills were appointed a committee on order of business, and while they were preparing a report Mayor Christman was called on for a speech. He said he was a republican and felt a little out of place, but he was against the republican party this time, and would take off his coat and work to beat it. He was called a whiskey man, and while he might step over himself, he believed in temperance as a good thing. The republican ticket, he said, was not a temperance ticket. McPhillips was a temperance man. He had never seen him inside a saloon, and he would like to see the convention endorse him, but if they didn't, they were going to elect him anyway. C. A. Wallace made a few remarks somewhat endorsing Mr. Christman. The committee then reported, and report was adopted after amending that ward caucuses elect committeemen. Under the first order the following resolutions were submitted:

Resolved, That the candidates nominated by this convention are hereby pledged to an economical administration of the city's business, consistent with necessary improvements.

Resolved, That the unfinished portion of Third street, east of the railroad track, be speedily completed.

Resolved, That an ordinance be passed and enforced, taxing all peddlers, hucksters, auctioneers and temporary stores within the corporate limits of the city, in accordance with the provisions of the city charter.

Resolved, That we favor the enforcement of all ordinances by the marshal and recorder, and if any ordinance be found invalid that the same be expunged.

Resolved, That the ordinance prohibiting the riding of bicycles on all sidewalks within the corporate limits of the city be amended so as to be operative only from May 15th to Sept. 15th.

These were considered by sections, and were all adopted except section 5, which was lost by a large majority. The following ward nominations were made: 1st ward, council, J. W. Gault; committeeman, D. M. Caldwell; 2d ward, council,

G. W. Jones; committeeman, W. T. Macy; 3d ward, council, W. D. McDonald, committeeman, Chas. Grissen. For mayor, Wm. Malone nominated Arthur McPhillips, and on motion of Arthur Smith the nomination was made by acclamation. W. L. Hembree and Chas. Saling were nominated for recorder, the ballot resulting 12 to 7 in favor of Hembree. For marshal, Keller nominated Malone, Wallace nominated Wardel, and Cozine nominated Henry Arthur. Three ballots were taken, the elective ballot standing Malone 6, Wardle 14, Artur 2, and the ticket was completed.

### Your Own Birthday Party.

This was the manner of celebrating Hallowe'en at the new Baptist church. You took a sum of money equal to the years of your age and paid it as admission at the door, in return for which you heard the program and partook of a lunch. The attendance and enjoyment of the occasion exceeded all expectation. Total receipts were \$71.48, which represented the aggregate number of years in the ages of those present. The program was laughable and carried out in the spirit of mirth. A quartette was rendered at the opening by Mrs. Boardman, Miss Glen and the Misses Snyder. Mrs. W. J. Laughary gave a talk on ye olden times, Chas. Greening spoke a piece about a man and his pig, and forgot his lines occasionally, telling the audience, "Now you laugh, while I think." A quartette of 1840 was sung by Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Hoberg, Mrs. Brumback and Peter Fellows, which was so good that they were called back and sang a different piece, showing that they anticipated an encore and were not ignorant of the methods of quartettes of 1898. Mr. Fellows appeared in a similar quartette a few years ago and forgot his glasses, but he was certain he had them this time. Mr. Okerson gave an address entirely in Swedish language, which was funny, if not understood. Mrs. Loughary and Mrs. Brumback sang a duet which showed they have taken good care of their voices. Doctor of pedagogy, Joseph Hoberg, conducted a spelling class, composed mostly of elderly people, which gave a good deal of amusement. Mrs. Hoberg was the champion speller, going down on "incomprehensibility." The program closed with a duet by the Misses Hobbs and Patty. Lunch followed.

At one o'clock the institute was called to order by Supt. Littlefield. After singing the Battle Hymn of the Republic, the following subjects were discussed: Miss Beamis gave an interesting talk on oral physiology. Prof. Snuffer's paper on the qualifications of the teachers brought forth a lively discussion, especially on the lesser qualifications. Prof. Hagerty then presented a few interesting remarks on the educational value of general history.

The question box brought forth the usual spirit and enthusiasm. The total enrollment of the teachers during the day was 38.

### Telephone to Tillamook.

The Oregonian says that J. H. Thatcher, superintendent of the Oregon Telephone & Telegraph Co., has received a telephone message from John S. Sabin, San Francisco, general manager, instructing him to take immediate steps to furnish, with as little delay as possible, telephone services to every town in Tillamook and Clatsop counties, connecting them with the company's general Pacific coast system. Superintendent Thatcher will take immediate steps to carry out these instructions by starting a force to make a preliminary survey of the line and advertising for bids for furnishing the necessary poles. The line will probably run by way of Forest Grove and North Yamhill to Nehalem, and thence up and down the coast to Astoria and Tillamook. The distance to be covered is about 125 miles, and, as this will require 6,000 poles, it will probably take about a month from the time the contract is let to get them on the ground, when the setting of poles and stringing of wire will be commenced at once, and the work pushed to completion as rapidly as possible. Owing to the mountainous country through which a large portion of the line will pass, the time of its completion will depend to a great extent on the weather, but no effort will be spared to have it in working order as soon as possible.
