Telephone to Tillamook.

The Oregonian says that J. H. Thatcher, superintendent of the Oregon Telephone & Telegraph Co., has received a telephone message from John S. Sabin, San Francisco, general manager, instructing him to take immediate steps to furnish, with as little delay as possible, telephone services to every town in Tilamook and Clatsop counties, connecting them with the company's general Pacific coast system. Superintendent Thatcher will take immediate steps to carry out these in. structions by starting a force to make a preliminary survey of the line and advertising for bids for furnishing the necessary poles.
