The sooner the people of McMinnville drop the chimerical talk about building immense drainage sewers, and take up in earnest the question of better sanitation for the whole city, the sooner will something of practical benefit be accomplished. It has been the habit for a number of years, whenever a case of malaria or typhoid sickness occurred, to lay the blame to want of proper sewerage and to look no farther for the real cause, although in nearly every instance a little thought and investigation would have convinced a person that the question of sewerage could have nothing to do with it. A system of well constructed and properly managed sewerage is an excellent feature of any town, and indispensable to densely populated cities. Its benefits, however, are chiefly confined to the districts directly connected, it is very expensive for small towns, and any other than a well constructed and well managed system is more of a menace than a benefit to healthfulness. The vicinity of Third street is generally supposed to be the most in need of sewers, and there it is proposed to locate the initial section of the plant whenever the enterprise is undertaken. This would be proper, because the property abutting on and adjacent thereto is best able to bear the expense. But the sewerage of Third street and a few blocks adjacent would be of little benefit to the rest of the city. The sanitary features of this locality can be as effectively improved without sewers as with. The same is true of all other parts of the city. Sewerage is impracticable and practically out of the question from a financial standpoint; other means are available and practicable. Employ a health officer with police authority to see that the streets and back alleys are kept clean; fill up the reeking vaults and cesspools, compel the use of dry earth in the closets and the removal of all excreta at stated times, and with a little expense, without involving the city hopelessly in debt, McMinnville can be made and kept as wholesome and healthy a town as there is in the world.
