It is the purpose of the new organization to establish branches in every county in the state. The plans of operation are to be of a self-sustaining nature. It is understood that this organization had its origin in Yamhill county, and it is reasonable to suppose that we may look for some of the benefits that ought to accrue from a well-managed board of immigration. It will be well to remember at the outset that boards of immigration require money to operate them successfully. Oregon is ripe for a large immigration, and here's hoping that this board may accomplish big charities for the state.

Irvine's grocery was reached and he set up the candy, and the new M. W. Mr. Matthias, cheerfully set up theologna at his place of business. Installation will occur the first Friday in January.

The choir of the [Presbyterian church church will render Lorenz' "Light of Life" on Christmas night, taking the place of the Sunday evening service. There will be about twenty voices in the chorus, and it promises to be a musical treat.

Miss Eva Brower died at her home in Happy valley on Sunday of consumption, after four months illness. She was 18 years of age. The funeral was largely attended, considering the weather, there being about one hundred and fifty persons present. Interment was made in Happy valley cemetery, funeral services being conducted by Rev. Joseph Hoberg.

A basket social will be given in the Jacobson building Saturday evening, the proceeds to pay for the official rosters, a copy of which is to be presented to each member of the Second Oregon upon its return home. There will be all sorts of baskets. Those prepared by the girls, young ladies and older ladies being kept separate that everyone may have their choice. There will also be baskets containing no names for bashful ones. Coffee will be served. Every interested lady, young or old, is asked to come and bring a basket. A good short program will be rendered. Admission free. Everybody come.

J. C. Cooper tells the Oregonian that "the members of company A, Second Oregon regiment, at Manila, are mostly McMinnville boys, and they have done the handsome thing by their sisters and sweethearts who are members of the Manila Guards, the girl-soldier company of McMinnville. The boys have had made, at Manila, and sent home, a silver medal for each of the girl-soldiers. It is made from a new and shining 20-cent piece, one side of which is ground smooth, and has engraved on it crossed cavalry sabers and the letters, "M. G."—meaning either My Girl or Manila Guard. On the reverse side is the Spanish coat of arms and denomination of the piece. The pin is behind a silver bar, on which can be engraved the wearer's name, and the medal is suspended from this bar by a red, white and blue ribbon. It makes a very attractive and historically valuable medal. The Manila Guards are keeping right up with their drills, but have recently lost one of their number by marriage—Miss Mercy Fleisher. they now have 40 girls in the ranks, and have received an invitation from Governor-elect Geer to attend his inauguration, which they will probably accept."
