#### Died in the Service of His Country.

The press dispatches of Monday, Dec. 12th, contained the surprising news of the death of Frank W. Hibbs, one of Yamhill county's brave soldier boys at Manila. He died Dec. 8th from dysentery and heart failure. His death was the one topic of conversation on Monday. Frank was the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. George Hibbs of this city, upon whom this news falls as a great shock. Their son enlisted in response to the first call for volunteers, and was a member of the local company of the national guard, which he joined on the day he reached his majority. Frank was a most dutiful son, and was in excellent health and spirits when he gave good-bye to his native heath last April 30th, and went off to war. He quit his course in college to enlist, and had worked hard the previous summer that he might continue his studies. His father took great interest and pride in the letters sent home by Frank, and a recent one contained a photo taken in Manila, showing him in more than usually good health. He was faithful in loyalty to parents as well as to country, and no boat left Manila without a letter from him. His parents have the heartiest sympathy of all in their great bereavement. Memorial services are to be held in the court house next Sunday at 3 p. m., conducted by the order of Woodmen of the World, of whom deceased was a member and held a beneficiary for \$1000 in favor of his mother. The memorial address will be made by President Boardman of the college. The Manila Guards and Emergency Corps will attend in their organized capacity, to participate in the last honors to the dead. Deceased was 21 years, 10 months and 10 days of age and a native of Yamhill county.

The latest Ballamy colony failure has taken place in British Columbia, and its ill success is explained in this way: "Soon after the colony was founded the brainy men ceased to think—the necessity did not exist. There was no spur to ambition, no competition. Then it was discovered that the work done in the shops and mills was so inferior that it was not marketable outside. Many shareholders in the community asked for their money back, but they did not get it. Some deserted. The common eating houses and the herding of families in big dwellings led to bickering and jealousy among the women folk. The men took up the quarrels of the weaker sex, and every man's hand was raised against his neighbor."

Like the empire of Charles V., the United States is now a land on which the sun never sets. Going westward the difference in longitude between Eastport, Me., and Manila is about 175 degrees. To the dweller on the Atlantic coast of the United States, Manila is very near the antipodes. Traveling westward from the eastern verge of the country to its western boundary in the far Pacific, a circuit of almost half of the globe is made. Except in midwinter, the sun rises in Eastport before it sets in Manila. In summer, autumn and spring it is daylight along the eastern coast of the United States before it is night on its western boundary. England, France and Germany also have territory so widely diffused throughout the globe that the sun shines on some part of it every hour of the twenty-four, but, of course, in contiguous territory we are far ahead of all these. In area, exclusive of colonies, the United States is the largest nation in the world, except China. It far exceeds in superficial extent, the empire of Alexander the Great, or the Rome of Caesar and Trajan. It surpasses the domain of Charlemagne or the territory of Charles V., exclusive of his colonial possessions in America, which were of indefinite extent, and which only technically belonged to Spain.

About twenty witnesses attended the trial of the case of Stout & Martin vs Yamhill county, taken to Hillsboro on a change of venue, last week. The jury disagreed, and the case will probably be tried at the same place next term of court. The suit is to recover on the contract for furnishing the last lumber put in the Yamhill river bridge at this point.
