**Announcement of Dedication.**  
 The new Baptist church of this city will be dedicated on Sunday, Jan. 8th, 1899. Rev. Alexander Blackburn, D. D., of the First Baptist church of Portland will preach the dedicatory sermon at 11 a. m., and Rev. H. B. Turner, of Emanuel church, Portland, will preach in the evening. On next Sunday, Jan. 1st, the first services will be held in the auditorium by the pastor, who will preach one of a series of sermons on Christ's sermon on the mount. The evening service will be introductory to the services for the week preceding dedication, during which week the preaching will be as follows: Monday evening, Dr. Grannis; Tuesday evening, Rev. Geo. W. Fender; Wednesday evening, Rev. F. A. Powell; Thursday evening, service in charge of B. Y. P. U.; Friday evening, Rev. Gilman Parker, general state missionary; Saturday evening, Rev. C. A. Woody, editor of Pacific Baptist. A series of meetings will begin on Monday evening following dedication, in which the pastor will be assisted by Miss Carrie Millspaugh, state missionary for the woman's mission circle and the state B. Y. P. U. The other churches of the city have been officially asked to participate in the dedication and in all these services, and the public is cordially invited to attend. The Baptists will dedicate their new church entirely free of debt, and no money for building purposes will be asked for on dedication day. The building is conservatively valued at \$6,000, though, in reality they consider it worth a good deal more to them. The seating capacity of the auditorium is 400, while the entire house will seat 800. The new seats are installed, and are very comfortable. They will not be varnished for some time, it being considered better to deler until the wood is thoroughly seasoned. The church will be lighted with electricity, and heated by furnace. The new lectern which will adorn the pulpit, is unique in design and finish, and is the handiwork throughout of Pastor King.
