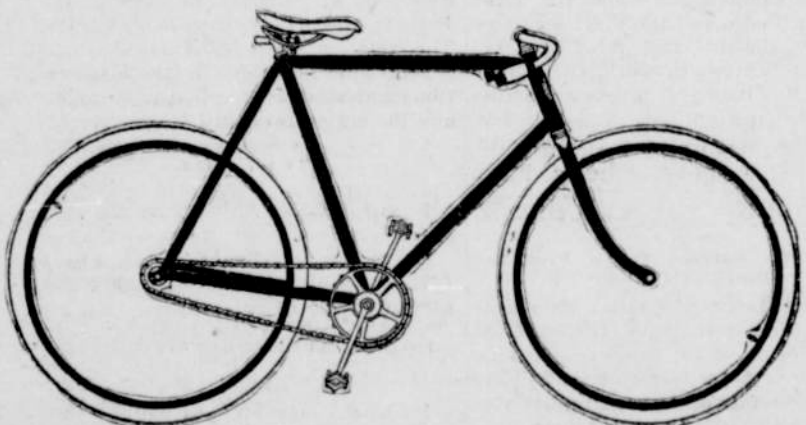

The next thing in order was the election of a director to serve three years. A. J. Hunsaker nominated W. S. Houck and W. G. Henderson named J. P. Irvine. The chair appointed R. L. Conner, W. D. McDonald, F. W. Spencer and J. G. Eekman as tellers. The ballot stood 43 for Irvine and 42 for Houck. It was a beautiful race, with honors about even. Mr. Irvine thanked his friends and assured them of his untiring interest in public school work, making numerous comparisons with neighboring cities showing that we have by far the lowest tax levy and the fullest treasury of all. In his remarks Mr. Irvine said the board was harmonious. Mr. Cooper asked, "Why not turn city affairs over to the board?" This created a great laugh. Mr. Daniel named B. F. Rhodes for school clerk, and moved that the clerk cast the ballot, there being no other nominations. Mr. Rhodes was elected, and on motion the meeting adjourned.
