In an interview with Mr. McEldowney
of the Broadmeads farm last week con-
cerning the culture of sugar beets, he
confirmed the item published in last
week's Reporter, regarding the opinion
of Prof. Shaw, but rather conceded that
last year might have been something of
an exception in producing second
growth. He was firm in the opinion
that the soil adhered too much to the
beet to make it practicable to wash them
by machinery. He intends to continue
growing beets on the farm, if for no
other purpose than feed, and will plant
them in the wheat field.

The Union Pacific, the Missouri Pacific
and the Burlington will join in the
homeseekers' excursions to the north-
west, beginning March 7th and running
semi-monthly thereafter, the same as
the northern lines. These rates will ap-
ply to all north Pacific coast common
points, and will be available from all
eastern points. From the Missouri
river the fare for the round trip will be
\$52; one way, \$26. The reduced prices
do not operate east of the Missouri or St.
Paul, but may be used as basing rates
from those points. The cheap rates are
available only for the semi-monthly ex-
cursions.

Mrs. Maggie J. Hewitt of Albany, wife
of Judge H. H. Hewitt, died in that city
of heart trouble last Thursday morning,
after an illness of about four months.

She was the daughter of Mrs. Jere
Rowland of this city, and was born in
this county March 18th, 1850. She was
married to Mr. Hewitt in 1872, and went
to Albany to live four years later. Mrs.
Hewitt was the first supreme chief of the
Rathbone Sisters in this state, and at
the time of her death held the office of
supreme guard. She was a sister of
Thomas, Marion and Newt, Rowland, a
niece of Green L. Rowland of North
Yamhill, and had many other relatives
in this county.

The good roads meeting at Newberg
last Saturday brought out the opinion
that gravel was the one thing needful to
make good roads. The Graphic says that
"rock costs \$1.40 per yard to put on
the roads, according to our present meth-
od of working the road. But if the
money was paid in and the work was
let by contract, it could be done for half
that amount. Gravel can be furnished
at the river landing for 50 cents per
yard, or delivered on the roads for about
\$1.10, thus making a mile of road cost
about \$1600, or \$800 for the gravel alone.
Several present said that they would do
considerable hauling free, while several
others proposed to pay cash. A com-
mittee of three was appointed to solicit
money and work towards making good
roads. The committee will call on the
citizens of Newberg and adjoining road
districts in the near future to see what
can be raised for this purpose. The city
council will be asked, as well as the
county court, to appropriate a liberal
amount toward the purchase of gravel."

New Ruling of the War Depart- ment.

Heretofore the soldiers returning with
honorable discharges from the Philip-
pines have been allowed travel pay and
commutation of rations en route across
the Pacific. Owing to the distance, the
money amounted to between \$350 and
\$400 for each man. The amount was
figured out by the paymaster and given
to each soldier on his departure from
Manila. This rule has been abrogated
by Secretary Alger. He will give dis-
charged volunteers what may be con-
sidered as a bounty of about \$400 for
joining the regulars in the Philippines.

Relative to this subject the San Fran-
cisco Examiner, which has received
numerous complaints against this action
of the war office, says:

"Several hundred discharged soldiers
have returned here with full travel pay
and rations money. Those returning
from now on, who live or intend to stay
in San Francisco, will come home penni-
less unless they have saved from month-
ly pay. This is an invidious distinction,
which, coupled with the coercive feature
of the order already mentioned, is caus-
ing discontent. If the war department
can pay travel and rations money to dis-
charged volunteers who are willing to
become regulars, the men do not see the
justice of withholding such money from
those who come back home.

"One of the papers being published by
the volunteers has this to say about this
order:

"The battery has been awakened from
its lethargy. Like unto a thunder clap
from a clear sky came the startling an-
nouncement that hereafter no more
travel pay would be allowed to enlisted
men discharged in the Philippines. While
the majority of us did not enlist for
transportation money, still the order
seems a harsh, unjust one. But, in the
language of the poet, what are you go-
ing to do about it?"
