The road question is discussed in No. 8. The neighbors and patrons of the school living east and west of the school house say they have no way of getting there, without having to go through private lands and it is impossible to get there through the winter storms. Unless they have a road they may have to divide the district. Upon questioning T. D. Henderson about the matter, he said: "Yes sir, there should certainly be a road, as there is no cross road between the Baker farm and Shelton's, and as this will run the entire distance on lines, I honestly can't see how it can be of more damage than benefit to anyone, unless it would be myself, as I own land so I can reach either of these two roads without trespassing on others. The distance between these two roads is about one and a half miles. I own one and one-fourth miles of the distance, and stand ready to donate my half of the road and will fence my part. I will also help bear a reasonable part of the expense of getting the road, provided the neighbors see fit to petition. I hope all interested parties will look at it in the light in which it is intended, for their individual as well as public good. If there is ever a road put through, now is certainly the right time to apply, as a good deal of fencing will have to be done soon, and the road could be opened this fall, and give plenty of time to get the material to build fences while the roads are good. For my individual part I do not need a county road, and if I chose to be obstinate, I could put lock gates in, and it would certainly be unpleasant to the majority of the neighborhood, as there is a great deal more travel through my place than most people think. We hope the matter will be satisfactorily arranged, as good schools and good roads make a prosperous community."
