Though this is a late year for flowers, the increased interest in the decoration of graves at the cemetery last week was all the more demonstrated, as there was more and better work done in that line than ever before. The observance of decoration day in McMinnville is increasing each year.

Mr. Maris, the gardener, says that last year he began marketing strawberries on the 15th day of May. This year, if weather conditions are favorable he will begin about the 15th of June. By the strawberry estimate, our summer is very close to one month behind time. He will have about a half-crop of the berries, but will have as many berries as last year, because he has more vines. He expects the season to be a long one.

That was a rare treat Rev. Herbert S. Johnson of Pittsfield, Mass., gave his audience at the Baptist church on Sunday morning. The writer is frank to say it was one of the best sermons he has ever heard, and he has been about some. It was primarily on the subject of "Jesus," and brought out the essential differences between the religion of Jesus Christ and the hundreds of others that teach much of truth, but fail to control the heart and will of man. Rev. Johnson is a credit to the town of his birth. He is the son of the second president in the history of McMinnville college. He gave his sermon on the identical spot where his father used to teach. Last year the educational sermon was given by Dr. Chandler of Bishop college, Texas, who is the son of the first president of the college. The idea was unique, and those who have listened to the two sermons, will await anxiously the opportunity to hear the son of the third president.

The Oregonian of June 3d published a very remarkable sketch of a quintet of sisters. They are Mrs. Miranda Smith, Mrs. Carolina Watts, Mrs. Zerniah Large, Mrs. Delphine Whalen and Mrs. Iola Handley. These five sisters, who crossed the plains to Oregon in 1845, are daughters of Daniel and Betsey Bailey. Their father died, aged 90 years, in Tillamook in 1893. The family trace their ancestry back to the time of Louis XVI. They were early settlers of the American colonies, and some of them became distinguished in the revolutionary war. The Reporter desires to call special attention to the fact that these ladies all spent more or less of their childhood days in the Chehalem valley in Yamhill county, and that probably to this fact more than any other is due the remarkable showing they can now make that they are doubtless the sole instance of five surviving pioneer sisters of so early a date as 1845. Mrs. Smith still lives in the county, and on the 6th of May arrived at her Lafayette home from the Hawaiian islands. She has three daughters, Mrs. Irene Calbreath, wife of Dr. J. F. Calbreath of McMinnville, Mrs. Almira Hurley, Independence; Mrs. Mianda Kimberlain, Lafayette, and a son, John U. Smith, an attorney, Hilo, Hawaii, news of whose serious illness from typhoid fever has just been received. Mrs. Watts, wife of Dr. J. W. Watts, is also yet a resident of the county, and is hale and hearty. She has had six children by a former husband, but one of whom survives, Sidney G. Dorris. He is a printer, and within the past few days has done some work in this office for Lafayette secretary. Mrs. Handley is the wife of T. B. Handley, a former Yamhiller, now an attorney of Tillamook. Mrs. Large is a resident of Forest Grove and Mrs. Whalen of Portland.
