The estimate of the growing crop of hops on the Pacific coast, provided conditions remain as favorable till picking time as they now are, is as follows: For Oregon 90,000 bales; California, 60,000 bales; Washington, 43,000 bales. Or between forty and fifty thousand bales of hops more on the coast this than last year. Oregon produced about 68,-000 bales last year.
