ONE of the depressing thoughts of the hour is that young America has several hundred less of fingers this week than he possessed a few days ago, besides being otherwise badly used up. Statistics from 62 of the principal cities of the nation show as a result of patriotic fervor on July 4th, the number of killed reported 3; injured, 1074. Fire losses, due to fire works, \$149,165. Of the injured 628 were hurt by cannon firecrackers; 113 by toy cannon; 60 by powder explosions; 59 by skyrockets; 143 by guns and revolvers, and 15 by stray bullets.

Andersonville, Ga., near the scene of the great prison camp of the civil war, is today a poverty-stricken hamlet of twenty-five little, unpainted cabins and a population of 200, more than half colored. The people of the region have a superstition against it as an unlucky place, and negroes in the neighborhood insist that when 14,000 men were confined there a plague of strange winged vermin appeared that covered everything for miles around. Memorial day is a noted negro holiday at Andersonville, but during the rest of the year it is practically a deserted place.

How They Were Entertained. Delegates to the National Editorial Association were received at Baker City on the morning of July 3d. After being given breakfast, they were shown the adjacent mines. At LaGrande lunch was served, and they were taken through the sugar mills. Pendleton received them in the morning with open arms, and gave them a grand reception. At The Dalles the people beat down the protruding nails in their sidewalks, and on the afternoon of the 4th, gave the editors an elegant dinner at the Umatilla. A drive through the city followed, with a look through the big warehouses filled with wool, where the visitors were convinced of the importance of this Oregon product. Portland was reached at 9 p. m. on Tuesday, and the editors were turned loose for their own amusement until Wednesday morning, when the regular session of the association began in the Marquam Grand theater. Wednesday evening the Eugene Field memorial service was held in Baptist White Temple. Thursday evening the association delegates were the guests of the woman's club on the road club's grounds. Tonight will occur the general committee's reception at the Portland hotel.

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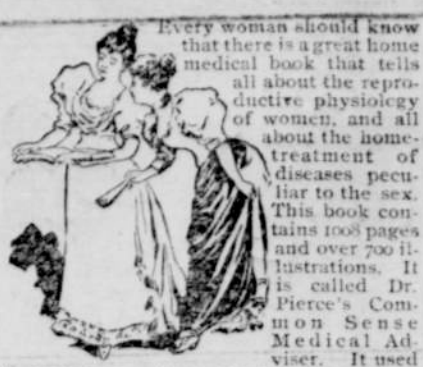

The Oregon agricultural station at Corvallis will be able to turn out judges of livestock by the score in the future, as they have taken up the practice of having the students judge livestock by points. Score cards are furnished the class, and each student is required to use his own judgment without consulting anyone. Great interest is being taken in this work. 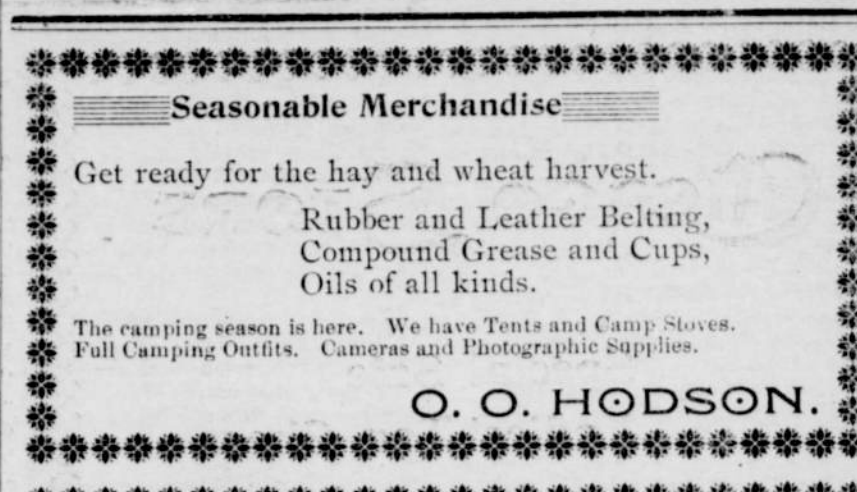
