F. S. Harding, accompanied by his wife, is in Portland this week attending the national association of editors as a delegate from the state. They will accompany the excursion to the sound next week, and will be absent till about July 18th.

E. F. Schneider of North Yamhill has secured letters patent on a new lifting device for fruit dryers, which will prove a very convenient and useful invention.

A section of trays is lifted by a lever, attached at the top, sufficiently high to permit the removal of the bottom tray, which dries first. The vacancy thus made leaves room for inserting a tray of green fruit at the top, thus keeping up the succession of cured fruit.

Albert Johnson, a youth of West Chehalis, has designed and put into operation a plan for mowing hay with pulleys and fork, which would do credit to a much older head. The rear end of the rope is hitched to a winlass, and a man winds it out as the team pulls. When the load reaches the highest elevation the fork takes a spurt to the point desired in the hay-mow. The device might be patented, but the young man thinks he doesn't care to bother with it.

A half-dozen families of Newberg and vicinity met in Churchill's orchard in the Chehalis valley and had a little celebration of their own. Prof. D. M. Metzger read the declaration of independence, and short talks were given by others, with amusements in the afternoon. It is said that Uncle Joseph Hoberg took a bicycle, and went off to a secluded place and practiced for three-fourths of an hour, in the hope that he might fit himself to come back and, like "Darius Green," surprise the celebration, but was forced to conclude that he was too old to learn new tricks of that kind.

The Salvation Army held a farewell meeting for Miss Pearl Bogue last evening. This young woman has been commissioned a cadet, and goes soon to the training garrison in Portland.

The Methodist Sunday schools of McMinnville and McCabe will hold a union picnic Saturday next, in the grove on Mayor McPhillip's farm south of McMinnville. Teams will be at the Methodist church of this city at 8 a. m. Be on time, or you may get left.

Duncan Ross was in town last Saturday on business connected with the proposed new county road, leading to the southeastern part of the county. He has canvassed the district, and has an expression from those whom the road would materially affect. Upwards of fifty have signed the petition for the road and bridge, six have signified their dissent, and six have refused to sign either a petition or a remonstrance.

F. X. Roy, who lives eight miles northwest of North Yamhill, near the Washington county line, was so unfortunate as to lose his house and all household effects by fire on Monday night. The state superintendent of public instruction has issued a circular of information from his office. Among other paragraphs of interest to teachers is this one: "After the August examination of this year, questions will be taken as follows: All questions in theory and practice and one-fifth of the questions in arithmetic, grammar, geography and reading will be taken from White's Elements of Pedagogy. All questions in literature will be taken from Smith's Studies in Literature, and all questions in psychology will be taken from Duell's Essentials of Psychology. The state board of education has decided to take these books as standards because the normal schools have adopted them as text-books, and because there has been a feeling on the part of many of the leading educators for years that some credit should be given to those who are students of professional books, and it has been suggested that a good way to give this credit would be to base a part of the questions for state and county papers upon certain indicated books."

Though the attendance at the entertainment Friday night, under direction of Miss Pugh for the ladies' guild of the Episcopal church, was light and the receipts were not large enough to greatly swell their fund, it may prove an introduction of new talent to the McMinnville public which will receive larger recognition in the future.
