Buyers of wool at The Dalles estimate that this year's receipts will be a little more than six million pounds, which is about one million pounds short of the receipts of last year. This shortage is due to the heavy loss of sheep last winter, and lighter fleeces. The price of wool at The Dalles has ranged from 9 to 14 1/2 cents.
