A woman notary public in Colorado was recently married and sought legal advice as to what name she should use in the future, officially. The attorney general of the state has finally given the gratifying opinion that she must sign all documents as before her marriage, for he finds no law compelling, or even authorizing a change of her maiden name on the simple excuse of marriage. In fact, he says that there is no authority for a change of name at marriage or any other
