Mrs. Wm. Ball has sold her home tract of 11 acres just north of the city to Mr. Robert Butchers, late of Eugene. The deal was finally consummated on Tuesday, the consideration being \$1,900. Mr. Butchers will occupy the place as his home. He is formerly of Minnesota, but for two years has lived at Eugene. He was a visitor with his wife in McMinnville during the state encampment, and like many others, fell in love with the locality.

But for the care of the kind providence which often directs our feet away from danger, a sad calamity would have befallen the party of campers, consisting of the families of A. M. Peery and W. H. Logan a few days ago. While the party was absent from camp for a short time a tree fell across the tent, demolishing some of the kitchen utensils and sinking its heavy weight across the bed where Mrs. Logan's little girl had been sleeping only a few moments before. There was genuine rejoicing in that camp thereafter.

The first arrest, in Marion county, for the violation of the state game law relating to the closed season for Mongolian pheasants, was made Friday, says the Salem Statesman, when D. C. Minto, constable of the Salem district, apprehended C. W. Bass, near Stayton, placing him under arrest for shooting pheasants out of season. Bass was arrested on the highway, and in his possession were found two young birds, which had been recently shot, the smallest of them being scarce two months old. Mr. Minto brought his man to Salem and at once took him before Justice of the Peace H. A. Johnson, where the culprit plead guilty to the charge. He was fined \$25 and costs amounting to \$15, and being unable to pay he was committed to the county jail to serve out his time.

The Lafayette seminary opens its fall term Sept. 26th. The faculty will be constituted as follows: Prof. C. C. Poling, president; Prof. D. M. Metzger, principal; Prof. A. F. Bittner, mathematics and latin; Prof. Rollie Lacey, preparatory; Prof. C. W. Kantner, music; Mrs. M. E. Weaver, art; Miss Mamie Ross, commercial branches. Prospects are spoken of as bright for a good attendance.

A. Bowman of Newberg was engaging numerous friends in good-natured conversation on Friday. He intends soon to return to Dawson City, where he has good prospects, and where he "wakes up" every morning. Here at home it takes him a half-day, he says, to wake up. He claims to have just completed the best barn in the county on his farm.

In his sermon Sunday evening, Rev. R. W. King answered the question, Why do the men not attend the services of the church? as propounded to the business men of this city and answered by them in divers ways. Some answered that the church services were not attractive; others that the preaching was not good enough; that the church members lacked interest; that those who went and refused to contribute when the contribution box was passed, feared they would be called "bummers," that many men were so hard after a bank account during the week that they were too tired to attend church on Sunday. The Baptist pastor thought the best and most forceful reason was handed in by an honorable business man who is not a church member, who said that there were too many places of amusement and gaming open on Sunday, and that if they were closed it would be better for the boys about town. The preacher admitted that the services might not be as attractive as they should be, yet the church is always laboring hard to make them so. The answer that the preaching is not good enough, he thought came close home to the preachers, and could only answer it by saying that it was in the power of the members to greatly aid the preacher by their encouragement and prayers, and there was always the opportunity of getting a better one by paying a higher salary, as attractive preachers generally have attractive salaries. At the Baptist church no one is regarded as a "bummer" who doesn't place a mite in the contribution box, and certainly no institution accomplishes a greater or better work for the amount of money expended than does the church. The lack of interest on the part of the members was frequently and sadly true, he thought, and a hearty interest on their part is always necessary to make a prosperous and attractive church.
