Said to be Suicide.

A dispatch from San Francisco, dated the 9th inst., announced the death of Mrs. Smith, formerly Mrs. Wm. Holl of this city. The dispatch is as follows: Mrs. Pauline Smith, formerly of Portland, Oregon, blew out her brains today as she was lying at the side of her husband, who was asleep. The report of the pistol awakened him. The wife died a few moments after firing the shot. She was despondent, the melancholia being induced by brooding over her past life, having been divorced from a man named Holl in Portland about a year ago. She thought of him almost constantly, in spite of her marriage to Smith. The couple was to have gone to Portland tonight.

There is doubt of the truth of the dispatch. Mrs. Smith was a sister of Mrs. A. Dielschneider of this city. The remains are expected to arrive here for burial this morning.

Death of an Old Resident.

David W. McCall died at his home in this city on the afternoon of Monday, Sept. 11th, of typhoid pneumonia. Mr. McCall would have been 74 years old had he lived till next Dec. 11th. He had been in poor health for two years, yet his death was unexpected to many friends. He came to Oregon in 1865, was an adherent of the Methodist church south, and a thoroughly conscientious man. The funeral was held at the home Tuesday afternoon, conducted by Rev. R. W. King, and the burial was made in the Happy Valley cemetery on Wednesday morning.

Chas. McCall of Dayton, Wash., arrived Wednesday evening in response to a telegram announcing the death of his father, but which he did not receive in time to enable him to be present at the funeral. J. S. McCall, another son, was expected to arrive last evening from Spokane.
