The Dayton flouring mills have been completed and made ready for steady work. Following from the columns of the Dayton Herald, will be of interest: The mills have the capacity to grind 60 barrels per day—has 5 sets rollers, four of which will be used for chopping and grinding meal. The building is 26x50 feet, 42 feet in height—3 stories with storage room for about 6,000 bushels of wheat. A late style separator. All the machinery in the mill is of modern style and make, and pronounced by those who have knowledge of these things to be the best.

The Portland Telegram states the case in this light: "Recent rains caused the Yamhill river to rise 14 feet in 48 hours, effectually stopping work on the locks at Lafayette. It was hoped that the fall rise might be stayed off until November 10, by which time it was thought the work could be completed. Nothing more will now be done until spring, when the contractors will turn in and finish the job in a short while. The trouble has been due to a cofferdam, which has washed out several times. Considerable wheat had been stored at McMinnville awaiting completion of the locks that it might be transported to Portland at a cheap rate. It is possible for boats to reach McMinnville during the winter season without the locks, so a cheap rate may yet be obtained."
