Died—October 29th, 1899, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Greer, near Dundee, Mrs. Julia A. Spencer, widow of Rev. John Spencer. Mrs. Spencer was 89 years of age, and came to Oregon in 1852. She was for many years and until recently a resident of this city. Her surviving family consists of five sons and one daughter. John J. Spencer of this city attended the funeral, which occurred on Friday, burial being made on the old homestead, where she died. Deceased was an honored member of the Methodist church.

The teachers' local institute held at North Yamhill last Saturday was a decided success. Thirty teachers were present and many patrons of the North Yamhill schools. Prof. H. L. McCann gave the subject of percentage, holding that in teaching this subject, much trouble and worry on the part of the pupil would be avoided by teaching it as a decimal rather than as percentage. He solved a problem to explain the work to the teachers. Prof. Reynolds gave a talk on course of study as applied to city schools, showing that the yearly plan was better for city schools than the division plan. He said the course of study was a good one and was satisfied that we would have better results by following it closely. "Course of study as applied to country schools" was introduced by C. H. Deach, J. W. Allen and Miss Ellen Beamis followed on the same subject. After discussion of this subject by all teachers present Prof. Haggerty gave a few thoughts on teaching geography. The teachers in session adopted White's Elements of Pedagogy for institute work and hereafter a lecture will be given each session by some teacher of the county. The reason for adopting this work, was that the questions for examination for teachers' certificates in the future will be taken from this work. The next meeting of the teachers will be in Lafayette.

Deceased was 63 years of age, and a most faithful workman in his chosen calling, as well as a good and highly-respected citizen.
