The governor of Oregon has received quite an honor in being invited to speak at the Lincoln Day banquet in Chicago February 12th. This is the first time in the history of the country that a Pacific coast orator has been invited to deliver the oration. It is possible the governor may accept, and his friends are satisfied that in so doing, he will do honor to the occasion and reflect credit upon the state.

The program was varied and extensive. Vocal solos were rendered by Robert Venon, Stella Redmond, A. E. Lambert, E. S. Warren, W. T. Macy, Mollie Patty, George McCutcheon and Mrs. Ethel Dorris. Piano renditions were given by Bessie Cook, George Adams, Edna Hodson, Pearl Campbell, Everett Latourette, Mrs. Asbury, Fleta Magers, Jennie Crawford and Freda Latourette. These were of greater or less excellence, according to the advancement of the pupil. Some members of the class are said to have felt strongly the force of the rule which makes public appearance compulsory on such occasions, but in realizing the strength of the rule and in their compliance to the best of their ability, they won much credit for themselves. The unique features of the program in piano performance was the opening caprice by Maud Hobbs and Mrs. Evenden—a duet on two pianos. The selection was extremely well timed, and was difficult. A piano quartet, Bocaccio, by the Misses Hobbs, Latourette, Crawford and Campbell, was among the most appreciated performances, and they were called back to repeat it. The college glee club made their initial appearance. The club is composed of the following young men: Messrs. Storey, Latourette, Fellows, McKillop, Converse, Smith, Brown, Hopfield, Adams, McCutcheon, Lambert, Cooper and Black. Although thirteen in number, there was nothing unlikely in their performance. They first sang "The Moon is Brightly Gleaming," and, if possible, they gave this old melody added charms. The audience must hear them again, and they gave "Every Day'll Be Sunday Bye and Bye."

It is quite unusual to get together so many young men with voices so well harmonized. The college octette was the choral offset to the glee club. It is composed of Misses Mollie and Mattie Patty, Elsie and Maud Hobbs, Grace Sutherland, Stella Redmond, Freda Latourette and Mrs. Evenden, with Miss Jennie Crawford as accompanist. They sang "Estudiantina," and were required to repeat it. This was among the very best numbers.

The Baker City paper has just discovered that it takes twice as many bushels of wheat to buy a stove as it did in 1896. Valley farmers have known that for some time, says the Salem Journal.

This is a stock argument of democrats and populists endeavoring to prove general hard times. It was used for a time in populist Kansas, but has been investigated along other lines, and the result was that the rise in prices as a rule has favored the farmer about as much as anyone else. There it requires 20 per cent more wheat to buy a stove than it did in 1896, but it takes 20 per cent less corn. It takes about three-fourths as much sugar, coffee or tea as it would in 1896. A bushel of corn will buy over half as much again sugar and coffee as it would in 1896. A ton of broom-corn will buy about three times as much of anything the farmer has to buy, with the possible exception of wire and nails, as it would in 1896.
