The association will probably be in the nature of a trust and control prices to a certain extent. For instance, the association may have it in its power to say that the price for a season will be 5 cents. Commission men, dealers and other retailers will be notified that that will be the uniform price, and can shape their plans accordingly. The usual disheartening slashing of prices, where one prune-grower sacrifices his neighbor's crop and his own at the same time, will be obviated. Prunes will then bring prices according to their worth, or more strictly speaking, according to the demands made by the market.

**A Shameful Assault.**  
On Thursday evening, Feb. 8th, Prof. J. J. Krap's of the Sheridan public schools was found lying upon the street of that town in an unconscious condition about 1:30 a. m. The presumption is that he was assaulted by ruffians who were displeased with the outcome of a trial of the teacher for punishing Don Townsend, a pupil. The directors investigated the case and sustained the teacher. Then the boy's father had the teacher arrested for assault and battery, the outcome of the trial being a disagreement of the jury. The trial lasted well into the night, the professor starting to his home after 12 o'clock. The recovery of the assaulted man has since been very slow, and at times his life has been despaired of. Editor Yates of the Sun speaks right out in meeting in his account of the case, and says that the feeling is growing that it was a low, brutal, cowardly assault. A rumpus of this kind certainly does no town any good, and no doubt the better element of Sheridan is heartily deploring the occurrence. The writer has a slight acquaintance with Prof. Krap, which leads him to believe that he is an honorable gentleman of high standing in his profession, and deplorable, with other law-abiding citizens that he should be made the victim of such murderous ruffianism. Let Sheridan vindicate her good name by ferreting this crime to the bottom. It is reported that the professor remembers the fact that there were three assailants.
