## LOCAL NEWS.

Sol Messinger will remove to Sumpter.

Representative E. F. Lamson of Willamina was in the city early in the week.

The Brockwood club was entertained yesterday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Dr. Cook.

Albert Bredberg returned to this city from Irene, S. Dak., Monday evening. His family remained in that state.

Mrs. Wm. Ball has moved from this city to Portland. Her daughter, Miss Lillie, is still here, but will follow in a few days.

Henry Gabriel has been a sufferer for some time from bone disease of the leg. The physicians at one of the Portland hospitals amputated the limb below the knee last week.

It is understood that D. B. Kingery, now in California, is investigating city property in McMinnville with a view to purchasing and making his future home here in the city.

Mr. J. L. Myers of Newberg has purchased a half-interest in Sam Gaunt's barber shop, and has moved to the city, occupying the Barnekoff property. Mr. Myers is a good barber, and we have scored a point on Newberg.

Odell & Wood, who have canvassed the subject, find that 42 families located in McMinnville or vicinity during 1899, and that there was invested during the year the sum of \$81,000. Ten new residences were built at a cost of \$12,000.

Mr. Trudell and wife will occupy the place.

C. E. Smith, druggist, was arranged before City Recorder Joseph Wilson on Thursday, on a charge of selling liquor in violation of a city ordinance, the complaining witnesses being S. J.
