Tired of Reform Under a Tenuous Banner.

This is the position taken by the North Yamhill Record in its issue last week. The Record is a paper that since its establishment has never until now been able to see any good in any party or movement that opposed it. In view of this it is refreshing to read the following political philosophy in its issue of last week, particularly the last sentence, which might be true if it didn't become the duty of self-respecting individuals and journals to engage in active political labor in order that corruption may never usurp the sphere of legitimate politics. We want to commend the Record for taking a big step in advance of its former position, and now that it has assumed political independence, we shall expect to see it supporting some of the republican nominees, if they should chance to fill the prescribed bill. We quote: The Record is and always has been a reform paper, to the core. No party or person on it. It is entirely independent, politically, but never neutral. It would take unqualified pleasure in supporting a union ticket made up of men of unquestioned integrity taken up from the ranks of the reform forces of this county. It does not believe, however, that reform can be accomplished at the hands of a group of "papsuckers," "healers," "worncuts" because they chance to be worn in parade under a reform banner. Some very peculiar and questionable "methods" have been seen to exist, heretofore, under that entire banner. Self-respecting individuals and journals can well afford to refrain from active political labor when corruption usurps the sphere of legitimate politics.

SALOON REGULATION.

Anything that is right will bear inspection, and anything that will not bear inspection generally needs to be inspected and condemned. This is evidently the proposition followed out by the citizens of Ashland in their regulation of saloons. Their new ordinance provides that the bar shall be in plain view of the street, and abolishes all screens. All saloons are required to be closed at 11 p. m., and are not to be opened till 5 a. m. Every proprietor of a saloon, or any place where liquor is sold, is required to keep a register, and any one buying liquor in any way except by the drink over the bar is required to register his name and place of residence, and if required, his age, and the register shall be subjected to the inspection of the mayor or to any police officer of the city. The penalty for violation of the ordinance is a fine, not to exceed \$50, no minimum penalty provided, or imprisonment in the city prison not to exceed 20 days. When a man takes a drink down there how he will be haunted by the fear that his wife or sweetheart is staring at him through the window. And what will the man do who hasn't the temerity to go in the front way? We have often wondered why saloons had screens and high windows, anyway, if the business is legitimate—and there's no saloon keeper who doesn't think it is.

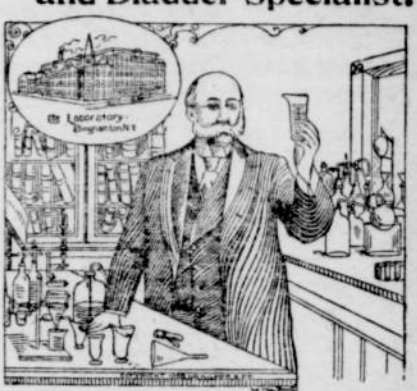
