#### RIVERS AND HARBORS OF ORE-GON.

Oregon gained over \$420,000 in 1899 Through Senator McBride's Influence as a Member of Committee on Com-

merce.

The following table shows first, the amounts allowed by the house of repre entatives in 1899 for river and harbo improvements in Oregon, second, the amounts granted by senate committee amendments offered by Senator McBride and, third, the increase thus obtained in the senate. This increase was \$495,500, all of which

was passed by the senate without an objection, but the house disagreed to amendments amounting to \$75.000, thi leaving a net gain for Oregon in the river and harbor bill of 1899 of \$426,500 and every dollar was obtained throug Senator McBride's amendments. Improving Tillamook bay and bar con-


