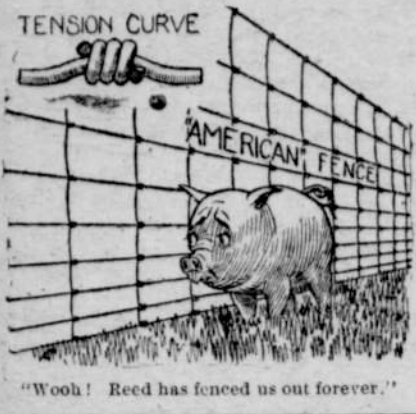

A Large and Harmonious Convention Places in the Field One of the Best Tickets Possible.

On Tuesday at 10:25 a. m. Judge Magers called to order the republican county convention. D. H. Turner was chosen secretary, and F. G. Adams assistant.

On motion of J. P. Irvine the chair appointed the following credentials committee: J. P. Irvine, Lee Laughlin, Jesse Edwards, A. H. Denny and J. M. Crawford.

On permanent organization and order of business G. S. Wright, G. M. Allen and E. H. Woodward were appointed.

Convention adjourned till one p. m. and on reassembling the report of committee on credentials was read, and after certain corrections were made and a motion by Dr. Watts that each delegation be empowered to fill its own vacancies was carried the report stood as follows:

We would therefore respectfully recommend that the above named persons be seated as delegates of this convention, with full privileges as members thereof. Respectfully submitted, J P Irvine, Lee Laughlin, Jesse Edwards, H Denny and J M Crawford, Committee.

On motion of Edwards the same was received and committee discharged.

The report of committee on permanent organization recommended retaining the temporary officers and named the order of business as the nominations appear in this report, and on motion of E. C. Walker the same was adopted.

On motion of Meyers the chair appointed the following tellers: A. L. Meyers, I. Daugherty, F. E. Storey, P. P. Olds, and Gus Detmering.

Hodson nominated Butts for representative and Watts named Lamson, both referring to the past records of their candidates in glowing terms. Lamson's early family connections were referred to, and the doctor said Ed's time, money, "Injuns"—everything, had been devoted to the republican party. (Laughter). On motion of O. H. Irvine the rules were suspended, and the secretary cast the ballot for these gentlemen.

For sheriff Bibee named John Bones. Caughlin named Alderman, and spoke of him as a warrior worthy of his steel in the precinct contest, and the arguments of geographical location, honorable manhood and party stronghold were all pressed in good shape. H. M. Daniel named Henderson, and thanked God we had a whole lot of good boys in this county for sheriff, and it wasn't advisable to swap horses in crossing the stream, etc. O. H. Irvine named J. A. Young, and spoke of his business qualifications, his affability, and his service to his country in the Philippines. Mr. Young declined with thanks.

Alderman was declared nominated on the third ballot.

Hodson nominated J. H. Nelson for clerk, and on motion of McKern the nomination was made by acclamation.

For recorder Snyder named A. P. Harris, Leabo named G. W. Franklin, Daugherty named C. B. Lafollette, Willis named Wm. Wess, Jesse Edwards named Hoskins, Watts named Harrison Foster, Post named Arthur Lapbert, and Allen named W. W. Nickell. Hoskins won on the second ballot. Harris declined. The votes were as follows:

Nickell moved and Foster seconded in good speeches that the nomination be made unanimous. Carried.

For assessor Huston named J. M. Yocum and Watts named E. U. Henderson of Amity.

The ballot stood, Yocum, 130; Henderson, 31. Nomination was made unanimous on motion of Henderson.

J. H. Olds nominated E. V. Littlefield for superintendent, warmly seconded by Profs. Stilwell and Hodson, and on motion of the latter he was named by acclamation.

For commissioner J. L. Davis named Geo. D. Vinton and M. M. Edwards named Amos Nelson.

The ballot stood: Nelson..... 92 Vinton..... 66 Winslow..... 1 Bones..... 1

Vinton moved and Bones seconded (laughter) that nomination be unanimous. Carried.

For treasurer Baxter named Henry Gabriel, seconded by Waddel, and Scott named O. O. Rhude, seconded by Winslow, Bibee, Wright and Stilwell. The vote stood Gabriel, 75, Rhude, 85. On motion of Gabriel, Rhude's nomination was made unanimous.

For surveyor, T. M. Laughlin named Branson and Wm. Young named E. D. Green. The vote resulted Branson, 102; Green, 55.

For coroner John Sanders named J. M. Chapman, and Woodward named Cummings. The former received 82 votes, latter 62, scattering 11. Chapman was declared the nominee.

PROCEEDING WITH CAUTION.

Pursuant to call the populists met in convention last Friday. Shade Richardson was called to the chair and Tom Vanorsdal was made secretary. The minutes of the meeting of the advisory committee on fusion were read, which showed that they had decided to nominate a ticket to be called the "citizens' ticket." The proposition is to give the populists on this ticket the offices of representative, sheriff and commissioner, the democrats to have all the other nominations. In case of election, all deputies chosen are to be of the same political faith. The democrats will consider the ratification of this proposition in their county convention to be held tomorrow.

At Friday's convention the sentiment was greatly divided with reference to proceeding to nominate along the line of this committee's report. Mr. Braithwait reported that the democrats were understood to be very desirous of keeping their party name at the head of the ticket. Mose Johnson thought that the priority of action of the populists entitled their name to as much consideration as any other, yet they could not accept and act on the report of the committee in good faith until they knew the action of the democratic party on the report. On the advisory committee there were four democrats for it and three against it, which leaves them to report only a bare majority, and they would not be likely to adopt the report. "All we can do," he said, "is to accept of it and adjourn, or reject it and go ahead." A. A. Walker couldn't quite comprehend Mr. Johnson's position. He didn't know where they would gain by waiting for the democrats. He wanted to go right ahead, and no kick could arise, as they were first and not last, and could elect their ticket through and through if they should hang together. W. G. Robbins favored adjournment without nomination. Johnson thought they might have to call another convention and fill a complete ticket. He didn't want to be the tail to any democratic kite, or join together unless they could elect their own men, and here made reference to the seat now warmed in congress not being properly warmed, as our congressman was a corporation man. Vanorsdal said he foresaw that they were going to split. "Are we going into the democratic party?" he asked. "I want to go ahead. I have been a reformer in Yamhill county for the last ten years, and can go over the county and pick out the reformers. It is child's play to go back on our proposition. We should go ahead or go down." Robbins moved to proceed on the report of the committee, seconded by Walker, who said "we have nothing to gain by falling behind, and have a perfect right to go ahead and place our men in nomination. The committee might have named a later day for this convention, but this they haven't did. I want to stand in for reform through and through. If we don't we will fizzle. We must either take back-water or swim across, and I say swim!" This was regarded as a very good populist speech. Perkins explained the position of the democrats on the committee to be that they had no power to make arrangements, but were only sent out to confer. Johnson also spoke for the committee, and said that they didn't name a later day because they hadn't any power. "They had been in convention, and you said this was the day we were to meet. If we name a ticket today our three men will have to go on the ballot by petition, and we won't have time to fill a ticket in a second convention." Johnson then moved that a committee of seven be appointed to meet after adjournment of the democratic convention, and fill the ticket if it became necessary to name a full ticket, and that they proceed to put in three men. There was no second, and Robbins asked Johnson to withdraw his motion until vote was taken on the motion before the house. Johnson consented and motion to accept the report was carried, Johnson voting against it. He said this meant that they must go on the ballot by petition. He thought it would be a fraud to call the ticket a citizens ticket, and asked if he would be in order to move to adjourn. A motion then prevailed that when they adjourn it be to meet on the 28th of April at 10 o'clock. The precincts of North Newberg, South Sheridan, Lafayette, and East and West Dayton were found to be without representation. It was moved by Johnson that a committee of five be appointed on resolutions and report at the next meeting. Carried. Chair appointed M. E. Johnson, T. F. Vanorsdal, W. G. Robbins, A. A. Walker and J. B. Perkins. Every one was requested to bring a set of resolutions, and let the committee jointly draft them.

On motion adjourned.
