THE GROUND WAS BROKEN.

How the Odd Fellows at Salem Observed the Anniversary.

The Chemeketa lodge at Salem last Thursday inaugurated the movement for a new temple. The interesting character of their ceremonies is given below, as described by the Statesman of the following day:

Hon. Tilmon Ford, a past grand of Chemeketa lodge, and a member of the building committee, standing at the northeast corner of the lot, called the gathering to order and briefly addressed the assemblage in the following words:

"Members of the Odd Fellows of Salem: We are about to enter upon the customary ceremony of breaking ground, preparatory to the erection of an Odd Fellows' temple upon this site; and that pleasant duty has been assigned to Judge George H. Burnett by the Odd Fellows, the building committee, the architects and contractors. He is the most appropriate man that could be selected for the purpose on this occasion, being a Past Noble Grand of Chemeketa lodge No. 1, Past Grand Master of the grand lodge of Odd Fellows of Oregon, and Past Grand Representative of the sovereign grand lodge, I. O. O. F., of the United States. He will now proceed to perform the duty assigned him."

Judge Burnett, who was standing ready, with spade in hand, said: "Gentlemen, on the 6th day of December, 1852, Chemeketa lodge was organized. It is numbered one, being the first Odd Fellows lodge on the northwest coast. It has been an institution of Salem all these years, and has never had a home which is dedicated to the three links—Friendship, Love and Truth. It is now my pleasant privilege to encourage this enterprise. It is begun promptly on time, and I hope it will be built on time; and now, in compliance with the practice on such occasions, I fill Brother Ford's silk plug hat, furnished for this occasion." At this moment the clock in the court house tower struck the hour of 10, and Judge Burnett promptly raised a shovel of earth and gracefully dropped it into Mr. Ford's hat, which stood on the ground by the side of the master of ceremonies to receive the first earth taken from the excavation. When Judge Burnett had finished his task, he requested Gov. T. T. Geer, who stood by, to take part, and Oregon's governor promptly took the spade and placed some earth in the hat on top of that already there. Judge Burnett then said:

"In behalf of Chemeketa lodge No. 1, I invite you all to smoke," and boxes of fine Havanas were passed through the crowd, after which Mr. Ford dismissed the meeting with the following words: "Our ceremonies are completed in breaking ground. It will only be three or four months until you see erected upon this site one of the most beautiful and commodious buildings, consisting of an Odd Fellows' temple and opera house combined, to be found west of the Rocky mountains. We now turn the premises over to architects Pugh and Gray, and to the contractors Erixon and Van Patton."

Judge Burnett had worn Mr. Ford's title, in coming to the building site, and before he left, bearing the hat filled with earth, he took a skull cap from his pocket and slipped it on his head. Mr.

Death of Thos. Kay. Thos. Kay of Salem died at St Vincent's hospital last Friday evening. The evening Telegram of Saturday pays the following merited tribute to this worthy man:

"In the death of Thomas Kay, not only Salem, but the Willamette Valley, and the state, loses a man whose life had been of more real service than almost any public man of the last half a century who could be named. He aided and built up a flourishing industry; he gave employment to scores of people; he worked up some of our raw material; he helped to give Oregon a good name abroad, even across the Atlantic; in spite of several discouraging disasters, he never flinched or quailed in his useful work; his life in Oregon was a blessing to this state, and tens of thousands, if they realized the worth of such a spirit in a new, undeveloped commonwealth like this, would feel inclined, if opportunity and circumstances permitted, to stand as mourners at his honored grave. Oregon has long needed more just such men as Mr. Kay, and she needs them yet."

It might be added that Mr. Kay received much encouragement in his enterprises from public-spirited citizens, which enabled him to do more than he could have done alone. There is a lesson in this, too, that when a worthy man is found he should receive all the necessary encouragement in his enterprises for the public good.

Judge Boise's opinion, unseating the McMinnville councilmen who were elected by the council to fill vacancies, without a majority of the council as originally constituted, is a surprise to some people hereabouts, who would have bet their money the other way, on account of an opinion given by Boise as counsel in a similar case just before he became judge. The same problem arose in Sheridan, but the case did not reach court. Probably a judge's opinion handed down from the bench, and the opinion of an attorney in a case wherein he is retained as counsel, are not necessarily the same.—Sheridan Sun.

The above is a copy of the election notice being posted over the county by Sheriff Henderson this week. Below we append a brief explanation of the constitutional amendments to be voted on: MUNICIPAL INDEBTEDNESS. Amending Sec. 10, of Art. 11 to read as follows: No county, city, town, school district or other municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner or for any purpose to an amount, including present existing indebtedness, in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property therein, to be ascertained by the last assessment for state and county taxes previous to the incurring of such indebtedness. JUDICIARY AMENDMENT. Amending Sec. 10, of Art. 7, providing for the election of supreme and circuit judges in distinct classes, one of which shall consist of five justices of the supreme court, who shall not perform circuit duty, and the other class shall consist of as many circuit judges as may be deemed necessary, who shall hold full terms without allotment, and who shall take the same oath as the supreme judges. The legislative assembly may create as many circuits as may be necessary. IRRIGATION AMENDMENT. Adding Art. XIX, making the use of lands for construction of reservoirs or storage basins for purposes of irrigation or rights of way for construction of canals or conveyance of water to a place of use for beneficial or useful purposes, shall be declared a public use, and be subject to the regulation and control of the state. REPEALING AMENDMENT. Repealing Sec. 35, Art. I, relating to restrictions upon the rights of negroes and mulattoes not residing in this state at the time of the adoption of the constitution. SUFFRAGE AMENDMENT. Art. I.—That the elective franchise in this state shall not hereafter be prohibited to any citizen on account of sex.
