





Woman suffrage was lost in Yamhill county by one vote. Every man who voted against it can now see what he

Ed Littlefield is highest man on the ticket and Clarence Butt the lowest.

The Indians of Willamina only cast one vote for cattle to be shut up, and voted 2 to 1 against their squaws having the ballot.

It was a close call for the legislative ticket. Dr. Matthis made a fine race, and VanOrsdol wasn't far behind.

The repealing amendment was the only one that carried. The sentiment in Yamhill is for free "niggers."

The opposition came far from getting all they wanted, but are taking their medicine calmly. Newberg is their bane.

It is doubtful if the republican party has a man who could beat Ward Sitton. He is a very popular boy, but ought to be a republican. Alderman made a good race, considering the popularity of the other fellow.

Hart has a handsome majority for prosecuting attorney in the district, and Dr. W. Tyler Smith and B. L. Eddy get the joint offices by big majorities.

Mr. Hunsaker is the leading apostle of prohibition, receiving 290 votes. The party vote will average about 200.

The highest vote cast is for sheriff, and is 3127, which is 270 below the registra-

Stock will continue to run at large, there being a majority of 529 in its favor.

Just What Was Wanted.

"From the way the election was carried off yesterday, I have reached the conclusion that that registration law is just the thing we have wanted for years," said a democrat this morning. "And now that it has proved to be a benefit, let the next legislature amend it so that only persons who have duly registered may have the right to a vote. The registration law is a movement in the direction of good, clean politics, and the republicans acted wisely when they passed it. To understand fully the benefit of the law it was only necessary vesterday to visit certain parts of the city and compare the conditions there with those of two and four years ago. Everybody knows that liquor has always been sold on election day. No matter how vigilant the police are, the law will be violated. Men will have whiskey or probably because the sight of a closed aloon awakens a thirst, and they will get it by hook or crook. In 1896 and 1898 they seemed to gain entrance to 108 half the saloons in town through some occult understanding with the doortenders, and parts of the city were thronged with drunken men and fights were fre-...... 83 quent. Yesterday I visited those same parts of town, and did not see a drunken man. The saloons were apparently John Hendrick, super dist 16 79 closed, but there were other means of getting liquor that were not the cause of 72 sobriety. The cause was, in my opinion, 79 the registration law. It knocked out the grafters, whose sole efforts in an election is to brace a candidate for enough money to buy a jag with, and then to raise a 108 disturbance. If that opinion is correct, let us all say, 'Lord bless the framers of the registration law." "-Telegram.
