The administration policy for governing the Philippines is explained by these extracts from the president's letter to the secretary of war, published a few days ago, and intended as instruction for the Taft commission:

"As long as the insurrection continues the military arm must necessarily be supreme. But there is no reason why steps should not be taken from time to time to inaugurate gov ernments essentially popular in their form as fast as territory is held and controlled by our troops.

"You will instruct the commission to devote their attention in the first instance to the establishment of municipal governments, in which the natives of the islands, both in the cities and in the rural communities, shall be afforded the opportunity to manage their own local affairs to the fullest extent of which they are capable.

"The commission should bear in mind that the government which they are establishing is designed not for our satisfaction, or for the ex-pression of our theoretical views, but for the happiness, peace and pros-perity of the people of the Philippine islands, and the measures adopted should be made to conform to their customs, their habits, and even their prejudices, to the fullest extent consistent with the accomplishment of the indispensable requisites of just and effective government.

All these measures for the ultimate elevation of the Filipinos into a law abiding and self-governing community are founded upon "the provisions of the treaty of Paris" and minstrels.
