It has been suggested that Bryan make a motion to call the election of McKinley unanimous.

The weather bureau at Washington forecasted for Tuesday, the 6th, a day without a drop of rain throughout the entire region of the United States.

President McKinley is the 17th president without a middle name. The list includes George Washington, John Adams, Thomas Jefferson, James Madison, James Monroe, Andrew Jackson, Martin Van Buren, John Tyler, Zachary Taylor, Millard Fillmore, Franklin Pierce, James Buchanan, Abraham Lincoln, Andrew Johnson, Grover Cleveland, Benjamin Harrison and William McKinley.

It is figured by the census bureau that the figures of the population by counties will be ready by the first of the year, and that all the data needed by congress for the reapportionment of representation will be available when the session begins in December.
