Petition for a new county road has been drafted by R. L. Conner and Capt. Maloney and forwarded to the county court of Polk county. It asks that a county road be established from the Grand Ronde store of Ellis Bros. down through the southern part of the reservation up Rogue river and through the pass to the head waters of the Little Nestucca to join with the Slab creek and Salmon river roads. There is a natural outlet to the coast there, which has never been opened except by Indian trail, and the establishment of a road would shorten by several miles, over routes now traveled, the distance to both Slab creek and Salmon river. The court is expected to act favorably on the petition at the January term.

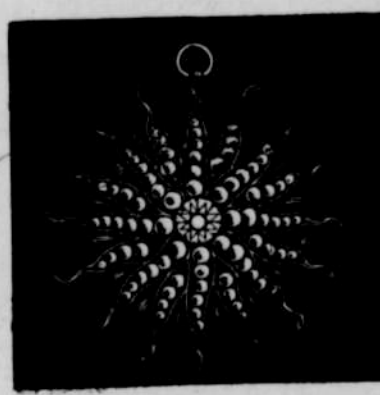
