Mrs. Naomi Comer, mother of Miss Cora Comer, of the McMinnville public schools, died at her home in Newberg, Jan. 23, at the age of 69 years. The Newberg Graphic says of her: "The deceased was a devoted wife and mother and never tired of doing little acts of kindness to those about her. She was a devoted Christian, and in her death the Friends church loses a loyal member."

The item last week to the effect that the dam at Meadow Lake had gone out, seems to have been an exaggerated report. The only work of the fresher was the taking out of about six feet of water by the removal of puncheon boards placed at the top of the dam. Repairs can easily be made, and Mr. Miller, the new proprietor, says he will start his mill in a few days.

While riding over the Watt hills recently, R. O. Jones shot a fine gray eagle. Its wings, when spread, measured six feet seven inches from tip to tip. Mrs. S. T. Likens will mount it, and it will then be placed on exhibition. This species of the eagle family is very bad about killing young lambs, and as Mr. Jones has a large number of sheep pastured in these hills, he thinks he secured a prize.

Rev. R. W. King has tendered his resignation as pastor of the Baptist church in this city, and goes this week to Baker City to enter upon the work of an evangelist. His farewell sermon will be preached on the last Sunday in February. Mr. King came to McMinnville in April, 1897, and has been a faithful and earnest pastor. Over one hundred members have been added during his pastorate, and besides this handsome monument to his labor, there is the additional one of the beautiful Baptist church, in the planning and construction of which he had much to do. Negotiations for his successor have yet to be made.

At the council meeting held on Monday night the office of mayor was declared vacant, it being evident that G. C. Carl had not resided in the city a sufficient length of time to make his election legal. The other officers elected took their seats and C. J. Edwards was elected mayor. A thirteen mill tax was voted. J. C. Hodson went to Salem last Saturday in company with Hon. Clarence Butt and will hold down a committee clerkship during the session of the legislature. Mr. Hodson is thoroughly competent and will do good service. Mrs. Butt and Mrs. Hodson, with the children, have gone to Salem this week to remain and look after their husbands during the session.—Newberg Graphic.

Senate bill No. 45, introduced by Senator Mulkey of Polk county, is a good one, and ought to become a law. It provides for the conveyance of convicts and insane patients to the state penitentiary or insane asylum by a guard or an attendant of the respective institutions. The bill provides that when a person shall have been committed to either of these state institutions the county clerk of the county from which the person is committed, shall notify by telephone or telegraph, the superintendent of the proper institution who shall immediately dispatch a messenger to the point where the prisoner or patient is detained, and accompany him at once to the institution to which he has been committed. The expense of conveying prisoners and patients in this manner shall be paid out of the funds appropriated for the maintenance of the two institutions. The bill has an emergency clause.

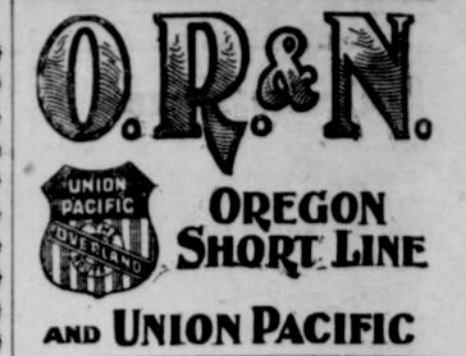
