NEWBERG DENIES THE CHARGE.

Pacific College Will Contest the Allegations Brought Against Their Orator.
The charge of plagiarism being brought against Elwood Minchin, the prize orator at the late contest at Corvallis, has thoroughly aroused the Newberg people, who feel that a great wrong has been done their college and their orator. A delegation of representative men were in this city early in the week for an interview with college authorities here, and a comparison of the oration with the alleged source of inspiration. The statement made last week that "some two hundred words were taken bodily" from "Martyr's Life of Phillips," was proved a misapprehension by the investigation. It revealed that the young man had made a close study of the book in preparing his speech, and used it as a reference in writing his oration, instilling some of the authors thoughts and language. Whether he exceeded the bounds of intercollegiate-oratorical propriety is the sole question in dispute. Pacific College thinks not, McMinnville and other colleges think he did.
The newspapers are not the arbiters of the question for the disputants. The Reporter's statements of the charge last week were made on authority of those bringing the charges, and with a desire to correctly report local opinion, speculation and belief. It has no enmity towards Pacific College or the good people of Newberg. The charge is a serious one, and by the testimony of all, is made against a most worthy young man, working his way through college by personal effort. The fight is not personal, but is brought on principle. It is quite possible that other of the orators are open to similar charges. President Boardman does not hesitate to say that he would not tolerate for a moment the use of a book to the same degree in his institution.
The new executive committee is the proper authority to decide the case, and it will probably fall to their lot in the near future. Publication of "parallels" has been made. Two illustrations are herewith given. Minchin wrote:
"Driven on by the ever potent desire for gain, men bartered away their fellow men; women and children were knocked down to the highest bidder; babies were torn from their mothers' arms and sold by the pound." The words of the book are: "Here it was entirely proper to knock men down under the hammer of the auctioneer, whip women and children, and sell babies by the pound." The last paragraph is the one of which complaint is made.
The second one comes where Minchin speaks of an anti-slavery editor who was "shot down like a dog," while Martyn said, "Lovejoy was shot down like a mad dog."
Other passages used from the book by Minchin are much shorter than this, and in nearly every case consisted of a phrase or clause constituting the groundwork for an elaborated thought in his own language. In his arrangement of the oration and the beauty of his climaxes, all concede that Minchin did splendid work.
